Marshland High School COVID Catch-Up Funding 2020/21



The Government are providing £650 million of universal catch-up premium funding, and schools are being allocated this money on a per pupil basis with a total of £80 for each pupil in Reception to Year 11. Our school currently has **831 children on roll** and we receive **£66,480** to support catch-up for lost teaching and learning over the period when schools were asked to close for the majority of children. Marshland High School has used research from the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) to produce an action plan of how the money will be spent.
