

Our English Curriculum

The curriculum is designed to develop students' sense of English as an academic discipline by linking its abstract frames and metaphors to concrete examples within a wide range of challenging texts including whole books, short stories, poems and plays with a wide coverage of genres, historical periods, forms and authors.

Characters: Protagonists / Antagonists

This scheme builds on students' awareness of how writers construct characters within their narratives for effect, and develops the punctuation and creative skills from KS2.



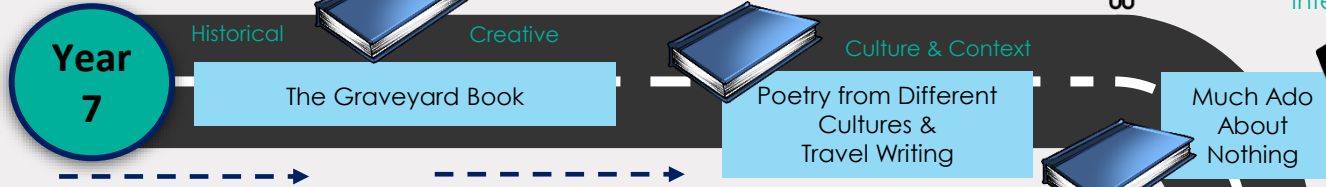
Place and Culture: Poetry and Travel Writing

These schemes focus on connecting time and place with understanding of how and why they influence a writer's personal experience, through analysis of how writers choose vocabulary & techniques to be entertaining.



Introduction to Shakespeare

This scheme is focused on reading and understanding Shakespearean drama – with an emphasis on inference & interpretation of language and performance, supported by key quotations. The play content also lends itself to the study of advice writing, considering the target audience



Rhetoric & Protest

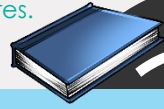
This scheme will seek to delve into the more profound notions of ethos, pathos & logos expounded by Aristotle. We also take a broad view of 'rhetoric' by including more subtle approaches to the notion of influencing, including through sentence structures.

Speeches & Poetry



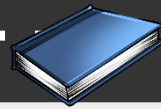
Symbolism & Debate

Summative Application of Knowledge

The final scheme of KS3 continues building on the knowledge and skills developed, through advanced study of a variety of short stories and poetry, with a focus on comparison and analysis.



Relationships

This scheme explores how a variety of relationships in life are represented in texts. It draws on all of the previous aspects of characterisation, perspectives and context to develop a more mature understanding that texts can be a representation of reality.



Morality

This scheme will allow for a more in-depth exploration of how different contexts create different experiences, shape decision-making and build morals for audiences as well as writers. We also look at how sequencing relates to meaning and impact on the audience.
